
Co-operative education is a flexible, cost-effective partnership between employers, educators and students.

Work Terms

Both work and academic terms are full-time and follow a formalized sequence. Co-op students can alternate their study terms with paid, monitored work terms in industry, non-profit, private business, and public sector organizations. Typically, Co-op work terms are 4, 8 or 12 months of full-time, paid employment beginning in May, September or January.
